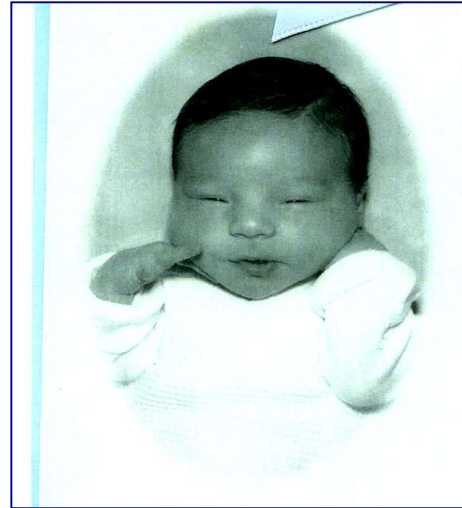

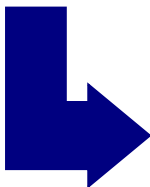

Authors handwritten note: need to beef- up mythological overtones. Maybe in the midst of this, Tony starts hallucinating and Patrick becomes a speaking woodland animal, such as a centaur??

Then, Dr Joel shows up, pleading for Tony to desist in the event that he might hurt himself. To persuade him, Dr. Joel breaks out into song and a tap dance on the cement block (Gene Kelly, Donald O'Connor, etc), Tentative song title: "Tip-Toe Through The Lawsuit", which ends with Dr Joel doing a backflip off the cement block. Tony completely ignores the dance routine and stays on task. At the end turns to the audience and just smiles enigmatically.

Act 3 Synopsis

Jean Marie in disguise hurrying up West Street on the way to the town offices.

SCENE 1:

Court clerk: "Hi Jean-Marie. Why are you wearing those crazy glasses and nose?"

Jean-Marie: "I don't know what you mean. You've put me in the difficult spot of telling a lie, which I don't do. Why don't we just stick to business. I need certain documents relating to a certain right of way issue of interest to me."

Court Clerk: "No soup for you, chickee. AND by the way, I don't like dogs."

SCENE 2: Dinnertime at the Rosas.

Jean-Marie : "Tony, I don't know how to tell you this. It's much worse than we previously thought."

Tony: “A conspiracy, again?”

Jean-Marie: “Yes. BUT, it is all starting to make sense to me. On top of everything, the court clerk doesn’t like dogs.”

Tony: “That’s it! It’s time to go to press!”

SCENE 3: Big Dance Number.

Dancers are the “Monmouth Beach Players”—the usual neighborhood crowd including some surfers and other beach-combers who may have spent too many days on the beach, plus a couple of drunk out-of-towners from Sallie T’s Restaurant and Bar. Dance scene is reminiscent of old Busby Berkeley Productions. At the end – everyone should be lying spread eagled on the floor with feet touching – opening and closing legs to make “flower” formations. Then a crane brings in a high dive with Isabelle in two piece American flag bathing suit with bathing cap on.

Crowd yells: “We love the two piece...”

Isabelle: “Its not a two piece, its my top and bottom!”

While dance number is going on, large movie screen behind dancers flash headlines:

- Local Couple Vow to Fight City Hall
- Area Doctors Implicated in Conspiracy
- Residents Reeling from MonmouthBeachGate Scandal
- Documents Discovered in Mayor’s House Point finger at Doctors
- Trial Set for this week!!

Act 3 synopsis

Authors note: more time goes by... show Ian in background carrying growing potted plant, now a tree, teetering across stage

Then a tremendous bang as the courthouse doors open and reporters dressed in 40’s garb come rushing out. One wild-eyed reporter runs to the front of the stage and announces:

Reporter: “This is amazing!! What a scoop!!”

Big Finale. Song and dance number starting with paparazzi. Entire cast joins including Jean Marie tap dancing down the stairs (lessons at adult education pays off!!). Accompanying music and lyrics tell the story of the courtroom scene. Lyrics should leave audience guessing at the end.
